MINISTERS'
REPORTS

2014 marked my twelfth year as your Senior Minister. Beyond the more predictable routines of preaching, teaching, pastoral care, weddings, baptisms, funerals, and of course administrative duties, the past year included several less-than-routine areas of ministry.

In the spring of the year, I initiated plans for the celebration of the 250th Anniversary of the Brick Presbyterian Church in 2017. Three years seems a long time away, but a sestercentennial is a singular event that begs careful long-range planning. The Session constituted a 250th Anniversary Planning Task Force ably chaired by Elder Kevin Greene. That Task Force envisioned a celebration that would include both commemorative and celebrative events in 2017 and a special fund-raising effort to begin earlier. Recognizing that our Brick Church School would mark its 75th Anniversary in 2015, it was quickly decided to coordinate the School and Church efforts. Over the summer, the Task Force and I interviewed a number of fundraising consultants. CCS Consultants was selected and they began feasibility studies in the fall and winter. In addition, key Brick Church leadership for that celebrative and commemorative side of the anniversary was recruited in the late spring.

In June, the General Assembly of our Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) made several decisions that had an impact in our congregation. First, the

Assembly voted to permit ministers and sessions “pastoral discretion” to perform and host same-sex wedding ceremonies. Brick Church’s Session had already begun to explore the issue after a request had come from an active member of the congregation for a same-sex wedding. The Session considered the question in a deeply thoughtful way that made me proud to be their Moderator. The Session voted to approve such weddings should the General Assembly make it possible. I was pleased to officiate at a same-sex wedding in the Brick Church in September of this year.

More difficult for myself and many of our members was the Assembly’s vote to divest national church funds from several corporations that do business in Israel in a way deemed to be harmful to Palestinians. In response to my concerns and those of many church members, I helped facilitate a meeting here in New York in July between the ministers and rabbis of the several of the largest Presbyterian and Jewish congregations in Manhattan. I worked with other concerned Presbyterians to draft and fund a full-page advertisement in the New York Times explaining why the signers believed divestment to be a mistaken strategy. I also asked the Session to create a Divestment Task Force to study the question in greater depth and consider additional initiatives on behalf of the Session and the congregation.

In the spring I was elected to serve on an Administrative Commission

of the Presbytery of New York City charged with initiating a Young Adult Volunteer program in our city. The “Y.A.V.” program has long been dear to my heart and I have been most pleased to assist in founding a Y.A.V. site to begin in the fall of 2015. Young Adult Volunteers is a program of the national church that every year commissions nearly 100 young men and women, ages 21 to 29, to do volunteer work around the country and the world. The program has been transformational for hundreds of young Presbyterians over that past decade, leading many to careers in ministry or other forms of service.

As it is every year, my central goal as your Senior Minister is to help you, the people I serve, to deepen your

Christian faith. This is, of course, finally not my work, but the work of the Holy Spirit. My human task is to create opportunities by which that Spirit might open us up as individuals and as a congregation to God’s presence and leading. I would be remiss if I did not thank not only all my wonderful staff colleagues, but you, the members of this congregation I have come to love, the faithful members of Session, Trustees, Deacons, assorted committees, and all the committed staff members with whom I count it a privilege to minister.

Romans 12:4-8 – For just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others.

This is the guiding principle here at The Brick Church with the youth. Only eight percent of our country's youth have been found to be "highly devoted" to their faith due to what has been coined Moralistic Therapeutic Deism, which is essentially watered-down faith. An illuminating example of a healthy ministry to contest MTD can be seen in the movie *School of Rock*. Jack Black, a schoolteacher who builds a rock band, sees talent in the children that they themselves did not necessarily see. By bringing out these talents Jack creates a missional community. The youth are simultaneously taught how to play their individual instruments as well as how to play it cohesively with the rest of the band. The youth were enabled to see themselves as an important part of the team.

The reason America's youth are currently struggling with speaking about faith is because they are not actively discussing it and showing it through their actions, they need a practical faith. A missional community brings individual talents to the surface and allows them to be used in participation with the whole. They are not just hearing the gospel or witnessing a minister act like a Christian, they are participating. The missional church

gives members leadership roles and through this work they develop and foster their faith and their spiritual meaning. I want to empower a church that uses everybody's skills and gifts.

I would like to thank the members of the three youth sub-committees: the Pioneers (5th-7th grades) Committee, the High School committee, and the Young Adults Committee. ARCHIVES AND HISTORY COMMITTEE

The Committee was created in 2001 by a Brick Church Long Range Planning Committee. The purpose is to assist the Clerk of Session, as historian and archivist of the congregation, in identifying and preserving books and items of historic value as they relate to the Brick Presbyterian Church in the City of New York, the Presbytery of New York City and the City of New York as it coincides with the history of Presbyterians in New York. The Clerk and the committee research and answer many questions from historians and families attempting to trace family histories.

The Clerk of Session is Convener of the Committee. Members of the Committee are Peter H. Brown, Holly Burke, Frederick A. Ehlert, Gayle Johnson, Thomas M. Li, Lois Z. Lovett, Margaret A. Raub, Ellsworth G. Stanton III, Margaret Stocker, E. Deane Turner, Jean M. Williams and Margaret D. Van Cott. The committee has called on the good services of Margaret H. Ellis as historian and Frederic S. Sater as photographer.

The committee is responsible for

the maintenance of the Herbert B. Anderson Library and the Archives Room and interfaces with the Presbyterian Historical Society, located in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This facility is the primary repository for Presbyterian history nationwide.

A major project this year is the completion of an updated history of the The Brick Presbyterian Church in the City of New York, being written by E. Deane Turner. Assisting in this project, in addition to members of the committee are Jean B. May, Charlotte Miller and Nancy S. Jones. Frederic S. Sater and Margaret D. Van Cott are doing photo research for the publication.

The other major project is a continuing one. That is cataloging and preserving print matter from past years. The paper records of marriages, deaths and baptisms are being computerized for research and easy access.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION: ADULT EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The mission of the Adult Education Committee is to enrich and deepen the spiritual lives of the members of the Brick Presbyterian Church by developing a variety of educational opportunities that challenge us and invite us to explore familiar ideas in new ways. In an effort to increase attendance and expand our reach, this program year we've been focusing on advertising and targeting specific information to attendees. Currently, Adult Education lectures reach 110 adults who have attended at least once. We have changed our publicity tactics, moving away

from expensive postcards and advertising through email, social media, and our website.

The 2014-2015 program of Sunday morning seminars began in September with a four-part series *Challenging Figures from the Old Testament: What You Didn't Learn in Sunday School*. Visiting professors from area seminaries and universities gave us the opportunity to wrestle with complex Biblical characters and to better appreciate how God can speak through stories of human flaws and failings.

In October, the Committee hosted

a two-part evening lecture series, *A Play-Full Life*, presented by Jaco Hamman, Associate Professor of Religion, Psychology and Culture at Vanderbilt Divinity School. Dr. Hamman focused on the importance of play and how a play-full orientation can enrich our spiritual lives.

In response to a request from the Session to address recent denominational changes regarding same-sex marriage, the Committee organized a four-part series in November entitled *A Holy Mystery: Discussions of Marriage, Covenant, and God's Gift of Love*. Lectures focused on the historical and cultural contexts of the institution of marriage throughout Christian and Presbyterian history, the perspective of Brick's pastors based on their experiences as officiants, and the importance of the marriage debates for the future of Christianity in America.

In December, the Committee highlighted ways in which Brick supports service organizations in the community by hosting speakers from Care for the Aging and from Search and Care. Both organizations are recipients of grants from the Brick Church Grants Committee.

Throughout the 2014 calendar year, a cohort of 13 Brick members completed a series of online courses as part of the Princeton Theological Seminary's Certificate in Theology and Ministry program. In January of 2015, Adult Education sponsored a panel discussion of program participants who shared some of the unique and surprising ways in which they grew from this experience.

In late January and February, a three-part series *The Greco-Roman Philosophers' Concepts of the Divine and Christian Theology* explored how Greco-Roman notions of the divine and the good life could inform our

understanding of the development of Christian theology and New Testament writings.

During the Lenten season, the seminarians presented the series *Stories from the Cross*, featuring talks on Pontius Pilate, the two criminals, and Judas. On Palm Sunday, Dr. Deirdre Good of General Theological Seminary presented a talk on Mary Magdalene entitled *Mary and Jesus in the Garden*. April featured a series on historical and contemporary perspectives on evangelism. The final series of the year is a special topic for our congregation: an exploration of the art and music within Brick Church. As in years past, Brick Church members will lead the Summer Bible Study on Sundays in June and July.

In addition to the Sunday morning seminars, the Adult Education Committee also sponsors weekly Bible Studies: a Men's Bible Study led by Rev. Lindvall and a Women's Bible Study led by Rev. Hutto. The Women's Bible Study, in conjunction with the Women's Association, also held a daylong retreat in February entitled *Holy Friendships and the Significance of Community*.

Members of the Adult Education Committee this year include Marc Engberg, Catherine Eubanks-Carter (Co-Chair), Charlene Kuo (Co-Chair), Dave Pettker, Whitney Schwartz, Gracey Stoddard, Joe Veltre, Mario Verdolini, Warner Williams, and Jaqueline Worth. We sincerely thank the seminarians and the pastors for participating as speakers in our programs, and we particularly thank the Reverend Rebekah Hutto for serving as our inspired and inspiring pastoral advisor.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION: CHILDREN'S MINISTRIES COMMITTEE

The Children's Ministry Committee (CMC) oversees not only the Brick Church Sunday Church School (SCS) but also nine other children's events that take place throughout the year. In the winter of 2015, 255 children, 2 year olds to 7th graders, were registered in the SCS program, with an average weekly attendance of 98 children. The SCS program is run by volunteers from the congregation with the assistance of Abby Smith, a part-time support worker, and Caitlin Sparks, the assistant to the Associate Pastors. The adult volunteers include 106 teachers, musicians, and superintendents who dedicate much time and enthusiasm to this ministry. Our thriving nursery program, which has 39 registered and averages 15 to 20 infants and toddlers each Sunday, is run by a committee of 21 members supported by six professional caregivers from the Babysitter's Guild in 2014 and reduced to five in 2015 due to budget cuts.

For our Sunday Church Ministry, no single curriculum meets the diverse needs of our program. We use Wee Believe for early childhood and preschool, and Spark for young and middle elementary, an Old and New Testament survey for older elementary, and Faithfully Asking Questions for middle school youth. The variety of curricula keeps both the children and teachers engaged and enthusiastic throughout their Sunday Church School experience.

The 2014-2015 SCS year began with a teacher training session to introduce all teachers to the curricula, music, SCS and nursery logistics, and the church and safety policies. An additional training session was held in January to gather feedback from teachers on the curricula and the logistics of SCS. We also made changes to our current registration forms to

include instructions and permission for parents of children in need of Epi pens due to allergies.

The 2014-2015 year included exciting children's ministry events sponsored by the CMC. We held our second St. Nicholas Party, designed for children up to 5 years old; over 70 children heard the story of St. Nicholas, with a special visit from St. Nick himself. We also held our second Advent Festival starting with the Crèche Gathering in the Garden. 78 children, ages 4-12, gathered in Watson Hall for Advent-themed crafts and music. The final event of 2014 was the annual Christmas Pageant on Christmas Eve. Nearly 88 Brick children and youth lead the congregation in the telling of the Christmas story. In the winter and spring, the CMC sponsored the Ash Wednesday Dinner and Seed Planting for children and adults (70 attended in 2014) to begin the season of Lent, Bible Presentation Sunday for 27 of our third graders and a family luncheon, and the Palm Sunday Project for 4year old through 7th grade children (78 attended in 2014). On Palm Sunday children participate in the Palm Sunday processional and proceed to Watson Hall to participate in Holy Week themed crafts and activities. Additionally, the CMC sponsors child-friendly activities during the annual Strawberry Festival, a bi-annual Communion class for 1st graders and their parents, and a weekly Worship in Motion class for children in grades K-5 and their siblings. For Family Sundays, the 5 Sundays designated each year for Family Worship, we have continued to ask children to lead in worship as liturgists in the call to worship, pouring the water in the prayer of confession, and drawing the artwork on the cover of the bulletin. Youth have also been willing to serve as communion servers.

The CMC has continued to grow as a committee, consisting of three subcommittees, one dedicated to Sunday Church School, the second to the nursery, and the last to the CMC events. The Sunday Church School class captains are Kaitlin Gambrell, Jeff Ferris and Whitney Schwartz, Anne Christon, Noelle Penna, Melissa Hong, David Rose, Amy Miller, Shyanne Roeloffs, and Sue-Peng Li. Committee co-chairs serving the nursery subcommittee are Rebecca Elder, Laurie Ferris, Lindsey Press, and Katie Stich. The committee members serving the CMC events are Alise Ferency, Brinlea Johnson, Whitney Schwartz, Jill Worth, and Anna

Yaeger. Our sincerest thanks go to our pastoral advisor Rebekah Hutto who continues to bring much excitement and enthusiasm to our ministry for our children, to Amanda Smith, Children's Music Ministries Director, to Abby Smith, our Sunday School Administrative Assistant and Worship in Motion Leader, and to Caitlin Sparks, the Assistant to the Associate Pastors for all of their support and hard work. Finally, a most sincere thank you to all members who faithfully volunteer to teach Sunday Church School or help in the nursery each Sunday.

With more than 200 youth in 5th through 12th grades, the Brick Church's Youth Ministry has maintained a steady and consistent program for its younger members. Following the advice and mission of the Youth Renovation Team, the new position for an Associate Pastor for Youth and Family Ministry was created to continue its focused ministry and to strengthen an active involvement among the youth. The Rev. Adam Gorman was called to us as the Associate Pastor for Youth and Family Ministry beginning October 1, 2011. Elder Stephana Bottom serves as the chair of the Youth Ministry Committee (YMC), Justin Skobe is our youth deacon, and Samuel Puopolo is our youth elder. Sam and Justin participate regularly in FNDP, High School Youth Group, volunteer with the younger youth, read Scripture in worship, do Minute For Missions, and attend monthly Deacon and Session meetings.

Our fifth, sixth and seventh grad-

ers make up the Pioneers group. Karen Glover, Susan Ely Johnson, Susan Crary, Cynthia Meyer, Neda Nevab, Elizabeth Miller, Sallie Abelow, Kris Bouderau, and Clare Pickering serve together as our Pioneers Steering Committee. Along with other volunteers, they are the adults whose organized efforts make it possible for our Pioneers to enjoy annual events such as the Apple Picking Trip, Halloween Scarefest, the Sleepover, ice-skating, and a scavenger hunt. The Pioneers have also participated in service projects, such as donating apples to Yorkville Common Pantry, cooking for FNDP, baking for Sunday morning coffee hour, and donating school supplies to St. Ann's after school program in the Bronx.

TakeOut is a monthly evening worship service designed and led by youth, seventh grade and above. TakeOut includes a message delivered by Rev. Adam Gorman, communion, and contemporary music during the worship led by Brick Day School

Teacher David Bedard. Following the worship service is a time of fellowship, pizza, and games. Take Out began in October four years ago and has become a well-attended monthly gathering with an average attendance of 20 youth and 5 volunteers. Members of our high school youth group have also been involved in writing and reading liturgy.

Seventh through twelfth graders constantly come together as the acolytes of Brick Church in the Order of St. Paul (OSP). OSP members are in every Sunday morning worship service as well as any special church services Brick has throughout the year. Members have the wonderful opportunity of assisting in the worship service each Sunday, carrying the cross (we call the crucifer) in the Procession, serving as flag-bearers, and serving as candle attendants, as well as assisting the pastors at special services. Come by and say hello to them in the Session room any Sunday morning.

There is another consistent program that involves all the youth in fifth through 12th grades on a regular basis: FNDP (Friday Night Dinner Program). Our youth-led FNDPs are held on the first and third Fridays of every month. Parent guest chefs such as Allison Gray, Stephana Bottom, Jennifer Anderson, and Laura Puopolo have been helpful in planning fun and appetizing meals for our FNDPs. Attendance of Brick Church youth has grown significantly so we have sheltered it from being open to the public. Also, the attendance of

NCS Residents has increased back up to an average of twelve. Brick Church youth have been enjoying their time together so much that we continue to sit around the tables in fellowship after the evening has officially ended.

The 2014-2015 Confirmation class is made up of 17 youth who have been meeting for classes since September. The class has been active in the life of the church by reading, praying, and lighting the advent candle in worship, collecting funds for local organizations, and volunteering with FNDP and the Day of Discipleship. This is a great class and we are excited to welcome these youth into church membership on Confirmation Sunday.

We have continued our High School Youth Group which started only two years ago and meets on the Sunday evenings that we do not have TakeOut. We have had as many as 15 High Schoolers and 5 volunteers at a time. On Sunday evenings we gather for games in Watson Hall and finish our time with food and a talk based on Scripture. This ministry started strong in the fall of 2014 and we ask that you continue to keep it in your prayers in 2015.

Youth have also continued to participate and have fellowship together during activities such as the Annual All Youth Ski Trip and Super Bowl Party, solidifying a community of youth who come to care for one another.

COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

In 2014, the Communications Committee had many notable and visible successes. We are able to reflect on 2014 as a year of positive evolution for Brick Church's communications as well as a year when we were able to strengthen our internal architecture of people committed towards our goals.

Most visibly, the Communications Committee successfully delivered a substantial "refresh" of the website for both Brick Church and the School. As a result the Brick Church and School community websites are easier to navigate and use. We redesigned the home page with more streamlined headings and categories, now equipped with visually friendly icons, in order to allow for better navigation. We also included helpful "quick buttons" to get members to seasonal or event-related information faster. The Brick Church calendar is now appropriately updated with current and long term events, and is interactive. Finally, we're using the power of Google for our low-cost search engine and free calendar. Members are now able to find the information they seek more quickly and to download calendar items into their own calendars in order to be better apprised of events and meetings. We delivered on most of the goals that we had slated for a much larger redevelopment of the site at relatively no cost and are proud of this accomplishment. More importantly, the Brick community has reacted positively to these changes.

Live-streaming of Brick Church

services and other events continues to be an important focus. This technology has become an important part of Brick's communications, and is widely used by many of our own members. Our Easter and Christmas services are among the greatest viewership, with 1,019 and 2100 viewers respectively. We get viewers from 51 different countries as well. The Communications Committee continues to refine and improve our technology and capabilities, as well as to recruit new staff and members to become educated on its operation.

Importantly in 2014, Brick Church welcomed Gina Eide's baby girl Kara Marie in late September. During her maternity leave from late September 2014 to early 2015, Brick Church allocated Gina's broad ranging responsibilities to a number of capable internal and external resources. We also hired a temporary professional, Mike Suvada, who worked hard to make the transition as smooth as possible. We thank Mike Suvada, Michael Shane, Rachel Cahn, and Rebekah Hutto for the exceptional collaboration.

The Communications Committee was fortunate to welcome many new committee members this year: Sabrena Tufts, elder Peter Manning, Brinlea Johnson, Brian Pitz, elder Gail Crutchfield, and Shelby Spears. We are thankful for such a committed group especially as we embark on a number of new communications projects in 2015. This year, the Communications Committee hopes to deliver an improved mobile application

of our newly improved website and to truly refine our live web streaming experience, among other things. We will also focus internally on systems and processes in an attempt to be more efficient with time, money and resources. We made great strides pushing costs down and will continue to be thoughtful about expenses and our budget.

DAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The Brick Church School's enrollment currently stands at 162 children in eight morning classes and two afternoon classes. The student body this year is made up of approximately 38% Church members and 62% non-members. Our excellent faculty has an average of 15 years teaching experience. The average number of years working at the School, for faculty and staff, is 10.

Following the successful completion of the 2005-2012 strategic plan, and commencing with the 2014-2015 financial budgeting activities, The Brick Church School launched a planning process in the fall of 2013. After identifying a steering committee and a broader planning group, the School worked throughout the following seven months to summarize its core values, update its mission statement, and prepare a relevant and inspiring vision for the next six years. Data were collected through surveys, interviews, and focus groups from nearly 300 individuals in The Brick Church School community. Opinion was solicited from current and former parents, faculty and staff, alumni, on-going schools, other early childhood schools, members of the Church, and the Day School Committee. The process was comprehensive and, at all times, collaborative.

Based on this work, the Planning Committee was very gratified to confirm the many strengths of The Brick Church School. Brick is blessed with excellent leadership (both in the Church and the School), talented and dedicated faculty and staff, an active, generous, and diverse community of families, a substantial financial aid program, and wonderful facilities, all of which provide an exceptional early childhood education to the students. There is a high and consistent level of satisfaction with the School among

parents, faculty, peer and on-going schools, and the broader community. The planning process also identified areas for continued improvement and those six areas -- the educational program, finances, diversity, leadership, faculty and staff, and values and outreach -- are the focus of the strategic plan.

The following pages summarize the School's values, mission, vision, and goals. Values are the foundation of every organization, and are reflected in the observable, everyday behaviors that guide the school. The mission is the school's purpose, and the vision is where the school is headed. For each of the six areas of focus, there are goals which will be used as a road map to ensure that The Brick Church School achieves its vision.

The Brick Church School's mission is to provide an excellent early childhood education, nourishing children's emotional, social, intellectual, physical, ethical, and spiritual well-being through an intentionally balanced approach in an atmosphere of warmth and mutual respect. The Brick Church School actively seeks to be a community that is diverse and inclusive in all aspects (racially, economically, religiously, and welcoming to all sexual orientations and family structures). The School is grounded in Christian values of love and compassion, shared by many other religious traditions, and seeks to be a place in which children, their families, and educators care for others in their classrooms, city, and world. At The Brick Church School, children are guided to become happy, self-confident global citizens, mindful of God's love, accepting of themselves and others, filled with curiosity and joy in learning.

THE VISION OF THE BRICK CHURCH SCHOOL

The Brick Church School will ensure that it has the financial and leadership resources to strengthen its commitment to maintaining a diverse community while expanding its horizons academically, ethically, and globally.

GOALS TO ACHIEVE THE BRICK CHURCH SCHOOL'S

2014 – 2020 VISION

I. Program

The Brick Church School will continue to provide excellence in education, which will be distinguished by openness to advances in curriculum and teaching, but will not chase after the latest trends.

II. Finances

The Brick Church School will be financially sustainable with a viable tuition and endowment model and a strong commitment to financial aid.

III. Diversity

The Brick Church School will attract a diverse community in an atmosphere of warmth and mutual respect among people brought together by a common purpose.

IV. Leadership

The Brick Church School will continue to be guided by outstanding leaders, both in the School and the Church, in order to attract, retain, and develop top professionals.

V. Faculty and Staff

The Brick Church School will provide the faculty and staff with competitive salaries and rich professional development opportunities.

VI. Values and Outreach

The Brick Church School will expand and support development of spiritual and ethical values as well as local and global outreach.

In accordance with the goal of developing our children's values to support local and global outreach, the School continues to support the New York Common Pantry, with the children regularly bringing in donations to Chapel. The School's relationship with the African Dream Academy in Liberia continues. In March of 2014, two Brick teachers, Katherine Gregory and David Bedard, went to Liberia with Lydia Spinelli to help the teachers there understand more about involving children in their own learning, as the Liberian school culture tends to be quite teacher-directed. The Brick children made bookmarks for the ADA children and the Brick team provided books to go with

them. The 4S children made a book about New York for the ADA children and the ADA children made a book about Liberia for the Brick children. The Brick children were given piggy banks that say “Small Change for Big Change” in which to save coins for the ADA children. They also learned about the differences and similarities between ADA and Brick through singing Liberian songs and playing Liberian instruments. ADA was not able to open this fall because of the Ebola epidemic and our efforts in the fall went to supporting the fight to curtail Ebola. Happily, the school reopened on March 2, 2015.

As part of the School’s effort to prepare our children to be global citizens, and after completion of a pilot program during the 2013-14 school year, Spanish became a permanent part of our curriculum in 2014-15. Children receive fifteen-minute Spanish lessons three times a week. In addition, our Spanish teacher, Madyuri Lopez, visits each class twice a week to speak Spanish with the children, whatever they are doing. Materials were purchased from Carousel of Languages, the organization that conducted the pilot program.

As reaffirmed through the Strategic Planning process, The Brick Church School is committed to maintaining a diverse student body, including economic diversity. We were pleased to be able to provide \$426,650 in financial aid to 23 students in 2014-15,

funded by a combination of tuition and contributions.

Summer Steps, Brick’s summer program for low-income students entering or applying to kindergarten in an independent school, completed its three-year pilot phase in 2014. Each year, Summer Steps was able to demonstrate measurable and statistically significant benefits to its students. This success prompted The Brick Church to extend its commitment to the program for five years. Summer Steps is also supported by donors and 21 partner schools: Allen-Stevenson, Birch Wathen Lenox, Brearley, Browning, Buckley, Chapin, Collegiate, Columbia Grammar, Convent of the Sacred Heart, Dalton, Grace Church School, Hewitt, Horace Mann, Leman Manhattan, Marymount, Nightingale-Bamford, Riverdale, Spence, St. Bernard’s, St. David’s, and Village Community School.

The Brick Church School recognizes and appreciates that the generosity and hard work of its parents make it possible for it to be a model early childhood school. Fundraising for the year, including monies raised by the Family Festival, the Children’s Fair, and the Annual Fund, totaled \$857,568. This helped to bridge the \$6000 gap between tuition and what it costs to educate each child.

JOINT FINANCE COMMITTEE

The primary responsibilities of the Joint Finance Committee are to set the budget each year in coordination with all of the Church committees, monitor the church finances on a monthly basis, review non-budgeted requests, and make adjustments during the year if necessary.

The committee is chaired by a member of Session, and includes representatives from both the Board of Trustees and the Session, as well as other church members. The following individuals were active members of the committee in 2014: Henry Barkhorn, Patrick Barrett, Jonathan Bean, Ian Devine, Stefan Kruger, Susan Lindsay, Roger Miller, Louisa Palmer, Tom Robinson, Joseph Sauvage, and Katie Stitch. Church staff members include the Rev. Michael Lindvall and Laila Al-Askari.

The key principles for the Joint Finance Committee's work are "inclusiveness" and "transparency" and we follow a budgeting and review process with those two key principles in mind as summarized below:

- The committee began its work on the 2014 budget during the summer of 2013 and worked with the Stewardship Committee to develop the pledge goal for 2014 which was set at \$2,550,000. The Joint Finance Committee met with each of the staff department heads and Session committee chairs in September 2013 to develop the 2014 budget. This process allows the committee to understand all of the Church's program goals and budget needs in order to develop and finalize the Church's annual budget.
- Thanks to the input and hard work of all committee heads and their members, Church and

Day School staff, and the Stewardship Committee, as well as all members of the Joint Finance Committee, we were able to submit a balanced budget proposal for 2014 which was passed in the December 2013 Session meeting. We were pleased that the 2014 budget allowed the Church to maintain and support a widening array of Church programs, activities, grants, fellowship, and outreach.

- In the course of the year, however, Stewardship proceeds began to lag behind the stated goal and we were forced to identify \$150,000 in budget adjustments to seek to achieve a balanced budget for 2014. Those changes came in the form of \$50,000 reductions in each of the building maintenance budget and benevolence grants and a \$50,000 increase in the draw on the endowment.
- As it turned out, Stewardship pledges came in well under budget. Despite our belt tightening, the 2014 operating results ended with a deficit of -\$264,484 due to increased administrative costs for outsourced accounting services, new Pastoral expenses, and extra staff, repair and electricity costs in the Plant Services area.
- In establishing the budget for 2015, the committee engaged in the same open and collegial budgeting process. Due to our experience in 2014 the committee asked each department to submit a budget which envisioned a 10% reduction in expenses for 2015 versus 2015 which each of the departments did, coming up with very thoughtful ways for our dollars to go further.

JOINT FINANCE COMMITTEE (CONTINUED)

- The Stewardship Committee also set a more modest goal for 2015 of \$2,400,000 based upon a detailed analysis of our congregation's giving patterns. With Stewardship having consistently enhanced its efforts over the last few years, for 2015 the Committee also set earlier goals for Stewardship pledges and implemented additional improvements to the Stewardship process. Early indications are that these efforts are bearing fruit and we expect to return to a balanced budget in 2015.

It is well worth reflecting upon the excellent use of the Church's resources achieved under the leadership of our ministers and the diligent efforts of our Church staff. While it has been estimated that the Church's programming activities have increased by about 30% over the last four years,

Church expenses have remained essentially flat over the same period of time. We should all recognize and applaud this fine effort.

At the same time, we continue to encourage the generosity of our congregation who we hope appreciate how carefully the resources they provide to the Church are managed.

MISSION OUTREACH COMMITTEE

The Mission Outreach Committee was created by the Session in 2004 to oversee all outreach programs and activities on a church-wide basis. The Committee includes representation from the Grants Committee (a subcommittee of Mission Outreach), Day of Discipleship Task Force, Board of Deacons, Women's Association Grants Committee, PrimeTimers Fellowship Group, and our new Prison Ministry.

The Committee has the following responsibilities: 1) to monitor all of the Church's monetary benevolence and volunteer ministries, 2) to make church-wide outreach policy, strategy, and priority recommendations to Session as needed, 3) to determine which new grant applications should be forwarded on to the Grants committee for consideration,

4) to oversee the new Prison Ministry, 5) to keep the congregation informed of mission outreach work being done throughout the church; outreach volunteer opportunities available through our mission partners; and how our outreach dollars are spent annually.

In November, 2014 our Prison Ministry, in conjunction with New York Theological Seminary (NYTS), established a group mentoring program, whereby Brick Prison Ministry volunteers and inmates enrolled in the NYTS Masters of Professional Studies program offered at Sing Sing Correctional Facility meet for 2 ½ hours on the second Sunday of every month at Sing Sing to discuss topics of interest to both inmates and volunteers. The goal is for these inmate students to gain a better understanding about life in

the outside world, and for the volunteers to gain a better understanding of what life in prison is like.

To further the congregation's awareness of various Brick Church mission outreach activities, Barbara Meachin has graciously agreed to interview volunteers and write stories describing their activities in *The Record* from time to time. Her first article is due to appear in *The Record* in January, 2015.

Grants Subcommittee

The Grants Committee, a subcommittee of Mission Outreach, is entrusted with the task of determining which organizations should receive Brick Church Benevolence Grants each year. We were very pleased to distribute \$375,000 from the Grants Budget in 2014 and \$8,964 from Affiliated Organizations Revenue, which is generated by the rental of our space. The Brick Church Benevolences go to a number of community organizations, many of which have a long-standing relationship with The Brick Church. These organizations are grouped into the following categories: Church Related, Basic Needs, Family Needs, Youth, and Elderly. Our funds either support the general operating budgets of these organizations, or are directed to special projects or needs.

The Grants Committee works diligently throughout the year to review all candidates through an in-depth evaluation process, which includes a thorough review of the program, its success metrics, the financials of the organization as well as an on-site evaluation. Each organization is evaluated on a number of criteria including

overall mission, organizational effectiveness, community served, and the degree to which The Brick Church and its members participate in the organization's activities as volunteers. The Committee's recommendations are presented to Session for approval.

In 2014 we were pleased to give grants to thirty-six organizations. Funding was discontinued at two organizations. In 2015 the Committee will work to increase our impact with the organizations we support by consolidating our funding, while potentially funding promising new candidates. The Committee this year was comprised of the following individuals: Michael Barnes, Karen Fang, Pam Ferguson, Amanda Heath, Annie Huneke, Tamara Leuchtenburg, Elizabeth Miller, Neda Navab, Helen Pennoyer, David Rose, Amanda Ruane, Peter Scala, and Cynthia Watson. 

NEW MEMBERS AND EVANGELISM COMMITTEE

The mission of the New Member and Evangelism Committee is to welcome and usher fellow Christians into church membership and to help develop and deepen the spiritual life of our visitors. In 2014, our dedicated committee members enabled the committee to fulfill its mission with enthusiasm and to build upon the initiatives already in place. Between October 2013 and May 2014, we welcomed 52 new members into our congregation. This compares to 62 new members in the same period the prior year.

New Member and Evangelism Committee members are friendly and welcoming ambassadors for our church. Besides extending the right hand of fellowship to people in the many opportunities available at The Brick Church, we continue to sponsor and support our own regular programs.

During 2014, our committee helped to welcome new members to Brick membership in the following ways:

We organized and hosted four series of 16 Membership Meetings for potential members. We added two additional meetings in the 2013-2014 series in an effort to increase the choice of classes between January and March. The first two classes in each series are taught by the pastors. The first class introduced potential members to the Christian Faith. The second delved more specifically into the Presbyterian Faith. Following these classes, we then hosted four Saturday morning sessions focusing on “The People and Ministries of The Brick Presbyterian Church” in which we invite committee representatives and the pastors to speak about various aspects of life at the church. We also provided breakfast and time for individual introductions, questions, and photo-taking for *The Record*.

We hosted four New Member Sundays, which include a pro re nata meeting of the Session prior to worship and a receiving line during coffee hour where we encouraged our members to greet all those who joined that day.

We hosted three receptions for new members at the Manse. Special thanks go to Michael and Terri Lindvall for their hospitality.

We held our first “Bring a Friend to Church Day” in February, asking the congregation to invite colleagues and friends to join them in worship for a day. Following worship, we held a special celebration during coffee hour, which included special food, materials related to volunteer opportunities and upcoming events, and a slideshow. Due to the great success of this event, it is planned again for 2015. We also organized and staffed an informational Welcome Table at Coffee Hour and other Brick events. At this table we offered friendly guidance on how to join the church, as well as bibles and information about church activities.

The second annual “Reunion Wine and Cheese” event was held in February for those who had joined in the previous 2 1/2 Years. The event was successful in bringing our newest members back together and may be continued on a bi-annual basis.

We hosted a June cookout for all of this year’s new members. It was our sixth annual barbeque and it was once again a huge success. The gathering allowed new members a chance to socialize with one other and to chat informally with members and learn about the many options for involvement at Brick Church.

We reached out to new members through our New Members Assimilation effort, which offers guidance on how to get involved in the life of the

church. It was the third year of our expanded “specific mentoring” element. Each member of the committee is paired with one or more new members in each class to invite them to upcoming events, to answer questions and help integrate them into active membership at Brick. SEMINARY FIELD EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The Seminary Field Education Committee invites and mentors three student seminarians to intern for a full academic year at The Brick Presbyterian Church. Over the past several years, The Brick Church has received students from Princeton Theological Seminary, Union Theological Seminary, New York Theological Seminary and Yale Divinity School. The program's objective is to expose the students to the many aspects and best-practices of a large New York City church, such as The Brick Church. Additionally, the students benefit from intensive fellowship with the pastoral staff, as well as the Church's diverse congregation. The Brick Church too is the beneficiary of the students' enthusiasm, energy and high sense of commitment. Since they represent different ages, careers and backgrounds, their contributions have been enriching.

Over the years it has been a positive and rewarding endeavor for both the students and The Brick Church community. On Wednesdays, the students will participate in staff meetings, colloquiums with our pastors, and in Session committee meetings. On Sundays, they play an active role in Worship Service, and before Worship they prepare our Sunday school teachers for the day's lesson. They also lead Adult Education on Sundays during seasons of Advent and Lent. All three students are actively involved in Confirmation Class. Each of them preaches three times at Wednesday Chapel Service.

In this current academic year, we have been privileged to welcome Chip Rotolo, Kaylin Milazzo, and Brian

Yount. Kaylin, who is from New Jersey, graduated from Fordham University with a major in Psychology and a minor in Women's Studies. Kaylin is currently a senior at the Princeton Theological Seminary and is a candidate for ministry in the P.C. (U.S.A.). Kaylin has done extensive work in youth ministry, hospital chaplaincy and crisis management. Chip joins us as a second year student from Princeton Theological Seminary, where he is currently pursuing a Master of Divinity degree. Chip is originally from North Carolina and holds a bachelor's degree in Religious Studies from The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Chip has lived and traveled globally, having worked in ministry in both Uganda and Japan. Chip recently became a member of the The Brick Church. Brian, also in his second year at Princeton Theological Seminary and pursuing a Master of Divinity degree, is originally from Indiana. Brian holds a bachelor's degree in Political Science from Hope College in Indiana. At Hope, Brian was a member of the varsity swim team. All three are active in The Brick Church. Each brings their unique experiences, faith journeys and Presbyterian perspectives to the Church.

In late January 2015, we selected our seminarians for 2015-2016. All three are from Princeton Theological Seminary and are in the second year of a Masters of Divinity program. William Wilson is from North Carolina, Virginia Goss is from Tennessee, and Robert Drake is from Minnesota. They will arrive in mid-September 2015.

cation Committee created the “The Brick Church Seminary Scholarship (Established through the Stewart Clifford and Colin Reed Funds).” The Scholarship (\$7,500 per annum) supports men or women under care of Session as Inquirers, exploring a call to become Teaching Elders of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and who are, or will soon be, enrolled as degree candidates at a qualifying educational institution. These scholarships are renewable annually, subject to conditions regarding attendance, grades and performance. Grace Lindvall is our current Brick Scholar and is studying at Princeton Theological Seminary. Grace will graduate in May 2015 with an M.Div. Grace has kept the Committee updated on her faith journey, studies and extra-curricular activities and we are planning to sit with Grace again in the spring of 2015 to hear more about her experiences from the past year and her fu-

ture plans.

The Committee is made up of Stewart Clifford, Tom Auth, Rebecca Davies, Catherine Eubanks-Carter, Charlene Kuo, Chris Mason, Kent McKamy, Helen Pennoyer and Sam Seraphim. We are fortunate to have a very active committee that is involved in recruiting, interviewing, selecting and generally supporting the students. Rev. Doug King is the Committee’s Advisor and is the Coordinator of the Seminary program.

Loaves & Fishes

The 2014 Stewardship Campaign, “Come to the Table”, raised \$2,426,249, surpassing its revised goal of \$2,400,000. 584 households made a pledge to the campaign, which achieved a participation rate of over 83% of The Brick Church’s active membership. The Stewardship Committee thanks all members who participated for their generosity and crucial support of the ministries and programs of The Brick Church. A list of all participants in the 2014 Stewardship campaign can be found at the end of this report.

The Stewardship Committee began its work on the “Come to the Table” campaign during the summer of 2013, during which time the campaign theme and written materials were developed. Every member of The Brick Church was contacted in at least one way prior to the annual Pledge Dedication Sunday in November 2013. In February 2014, the Committee held its annual Phonathon (jointly with the Congregational Fellowship Committee) and in March added a Spring Break Calling Campaign to those who had not yet pledged.

Recognizing that the original \$2,550,000 goal might not be achieved as a result of unforeseen circumstances for a number of Brick’s donors, the Stewardship Committee conducted a special Mother’s Day Appeal in early May 2014. Rev. Lindvall and the Stewardship Chair sent a special Mother’s Day Offering request to the congregation asking for additional support in order to avoid cuts to church’s programs and Mission Outreach budget. The Mother’s Day offering appeal resulted in additional support of over \$48,000 from members who had already pledged. Thankfully, due to this incredible generosity, we were

able to avoid steep cuts.

This year, the Stewardship Committee together with the Joint Finance Committee set a 2015 congregational stewardship goal of \$2,400,000, equal to the revised goal last year. While over the past two years the Joint Finance Committee has trimmed the church operating budget and instituted policies that will result in long term savings, the cost to operate our multi-faceted church programs, maintain our physical plant, and fund mission outreach at a sustainable level is approximately \$5,500 per family. Stewardship pledges must be counted on to provide over 60% of the monies necessary to fund this life and mission of our church.

For the 2015 campaign, the Stewardship Committee has chosen the theme “Loaves & Fishes.” The Stewardship Committee has chosen the miracle of the Loaves and Fishes this year to highlight how your gift to The Brick Church multiplies in the good that it does. Each year, we touch more than 54,000 people through all of our programs. The Brick Church community has responded with steadfast commitment and ongoing generosity and as of April 27, 2015, 69% of Brick households have pledged to the campaign aggregating more than \$2,293,000 in pledges to the 2015 Stewardship campaign. To date, 169 households increased the amount of their pledge from that made during the last campaign, 194 stayed at their 2014 level, and 72 decreased the amount of their pledge. In addition, 51 households pledged that did not participate in the 2013-2014 campaign.

The Committee continues to focus on three important areas: educating new members about the critical role of stewardship in church membership, clarifying for all members the direct connection between stewardship and

the life and mission of our Church, and bringing all active members into the annual stewardship campaign at a level appropriate for their household. In an effort to further those efforts, this year we: 1) held a stewardship celebration on Pledge Dedication Sunday during coffee hour, which included a stewardship slideshow which was then posted on the website; 2) continued a delegated sub-committee system for campaign efforts similar to the Session committee structure; 3) wrote personal notes to members encouraging them to pledge; and 4) continued the all-church phonathon in cooperation with the Congregational Fellowship Committee.

A new sub-committee, the “Campaign Launch” subcommittee was added at the beginning of the campaign to help generate excitement prior to Pledge Dedication Sunday. This committee planned and implemented a Town Hall Meeting in early November 2014. A survey was sent to all members of the congregation in preparation for the meeting, and over 94% of the survey respondents felt that the ongoing programs of the church enhance and support its defining characteristics: including an active supportive community, excellent worship services, mission outreach, Christian education, and support of children and youth. A video of speakers’ presentations was then edited and hosted on the giving page of the website.

We view our collective call not simply to help fund the budget but, as importantly, to help engage our congregation. The success of this year’s campaign can be attributed directly to the hard work and dedication of the Stewardship Committee whose members include: Henry Barkhorn, Peter Brown, Christina Blaustein, Jeffrey Ferris, Carole Foxley, Linda

Gridley, Robert Masella, Peggy Raub, Tom Robinson, Francis Tucci, David Wells, and Jorie Widener.

Linda Thompson is our church liaison and Rev. Michael Lindvall provides significant campaign leadership.

We thank you with deep gratitude for your consistent support of the life and mission of The Brick Presbyterian Church.

250TH
ANNIVERSARY
TASK FORCE

In anticipation of the 250th Anniversary of the Church and the 75th Anniversary of the School, Session created a 250th Anniversary Task Force in May of 2014. The purpose of the Task Force was to interview and select a professional firm that would measure the interest and support for a special campaign to address Brick's most urgent priorities and long term needs. Following interviews with a number of firms, the Task Force selected CCS, a management consulting firm with a wealth of experience in the religious and education sectors, in October of 2014. CCS then conducted a Campaign Planning and Feasibility Study which engaged members across the Brick community and analyzed Church and School financial data and giving history. The results of the Study confirmed great support for a capital campaign that would strengthen the Church and School for the future. In the Spring of 2015, the Session and the Day School Committee of Session unanimously endorsed moving forward with a comprehensive cam-

aign to strengthen the Church and the School. In April 2015, CCS was retained to help manage the effort and the Task Force was formally dismissed. Session then approved a new committee structure that would support the planning and future success of the campaign, including; An Executive Committee, Church and School Capital Campaign Committees, Church and School Celebration Committees, a Church and School Capital Improvements Committee and a Church Outreach Committee. WORSHIP AND MUSIC COMMITTEE

The Worship and Music Committee of The Brick Church explores worship, with God's help, in conjunction with the senior pastor, following our Reformed faith and our Presbyterian tradition. We regularly evaluate our form and order of worship. The committee, working with the senior pastor, the minister of music, and the director of children's music, shapes the content, diversity, and frequency of worship services for the spiritual enrichment of all. This includes all aspects of services of worship.

We propose dates to Session for the celebration of the sacrament of Holy Communion, oversee the chancel committee, and enlist and train church officers to assist the pastors in serving the sacrament. The committee recommends dates to Session for the celebration of the sacrament of Holy Baptism, to take place during congregational worship, and assigns elders to assist in the service. We oversee the Ushers Association, the Order of St. Paul, and help with church festivals and special services. This includes the greening of the Sanctuary for Advent and Christmas, overseeing the candle-light Advent Service of Lessons and Carols, and helping to plan and implement special services during Holy Week and Easter.

During 2014, the committee expanded. Meetings followed a robust agenda with opening and closing

DEACON OUTREACH MINISTRIES: DEACON'S CHRISTMAS PARTY

One of the highlights of the Christmas season at Brick Church continues to be the Deacons' Outreach Christmas Party. This year we once again had the opportunity to partner with The Jericho Project. With our ever-enthusiastic group of volunteers, we hosted 90 children and 50 parents for a day of holiday celebration and activities. Attendees and volunteers alike filled Watson Hall with merriment and laughter.

Founded in 1983 as a soup kitchen in a church basement on the Upper West Side, Jericho has worked to fulfill its mission to end homelessness by providing safe affordable housing coupled with individualized substance abuse prevention, family support, career, and educational counseling to over 1,000 adults and children annually. Since its inception in 1983, Jericho has increased its number of supportive housing units from 35 to over 540, enabling it to better service the growing number of needy families in the metropolitan area.

The party festivities included Nintendo Wii stations, ping-pong, pop-a-

shot basketball, face painting, arts and crafts and more. Guests enjoyed a festive lunch, and the event was capped off by a visit from jolly ole' St. Nick. We were thrilled this year to have an abundant shopping mall for both the children and the adults thanks to the generosity of Brick congregants and School families. In particular, we are thankful for the contributions of Holly Miller, who donated all of the toys from her birthday party, as well as Robby Browne of the Corcoran Group, whose SAGE Toy Party has already provided several hundred toys for next year's party, ensuring that we will once again be able to make the Christmas dreams of children in need come true. Finally, this party would not have been a success without the hard work, energy, smiles and warm hearts of our many volunteers who chose to spend their Saturday in fellowship and outreach during this very busy time of year.

DRIVES

The Brick Church Congregation has made a consistent commitment to provide the New York Blood Center (NYBC) with life-saving blood and blood products. Two blood drives are held, in the Fall and Winter, in conjunction with the NYBC. The first drive was held on Sunday, February 9, 2014 and the second was held on Sunday, October 26, 2014. Despite revised donor eligibility guidelines, which have been tightened significantly over the last few years, we donated many pints of blood between our winter and fall drives. Both blood drives yielded well

over 30 pints of blood — significantly above the long term average for a Brick blood drive.

The Brick Church's ongoing commitment to the New York Blood Center helped supply nearly 200 hospitals in our area. Our month-long effort before each drive to expand the donor database includes a broad email campaign, phone calls, church announcements, distribution of flyers, and weekly sign-up solicitations in order to ensure a healthy turnout.

The Neighborhood Coalition for Shelter East 81st Street Residence is a long term, supportive housing facility for people who have come through their shelter program. Formerly homeless, the residents live independently but, like all of us, need some support, tender loving care and spiritual fellowship.

During the past year, residents of the Neighborhood Coalition for Shelter (“NCS”) have been dining with members of The Brick Church every Friday evening (Friday Night Dinner Program or “FNDDP”). Brick Church has had a long-standing and close friendship with NCS. Each week, Brick Church Deacons and volunteers plan the dinner menu, then purchase and cook the food to be served. The program is a labor of love for our Deacons and volunteers who take “end-to-end” responsibility for the entire meal.

FNDDP offers the residents a time for fellowship and community with one another and our Brick Church members. Many residents are extremely outgoing and the evenings rarely have a shortage of engaging conversation. But most importantly, our FNDDP Deacons strive to serve as witness to

the Lord’s presence among this group who are all working hard to overcome past hardships. Grace before each meal reminds us all of the blessing of being welcomed to the Lord’s table.

The second, fourth and fifth Fridays are coordinated by Deacons Melissa Manice, Nigel Glenday, Adrienne Miller and Mike Press along with volunteers from the congregation and beyond. Deacon hosted evenings have returned to be on site at the NCS location on 211 East 81st The Friday night hosts have been consistently serving 30 meals each evening. The Christmas dinner and the end of the year BBQ, both hosted at Brick, are another wonderful way to have the residents visit Brick although attendance is lighter than when hosted at NCS. Week after week, we serve up good food, have interesting conversations and share a warm camaraderie with our neighbors from NCS. It’s a wonderful way to spend a Friday night.

FRIDAY NIGHT DINNER PROGRAM (FNDDP) FOR THE NEIGHBORHOOD COALITION FOR SHELTER

NEW MEMBERS MINISTRY

New York Common Pantry (formerly Yorkville Common Pantry) opened in 1980 as a small neighborhood pantry serving 30 families on the Upper East Side. Today it is a city-wide leader in emergency food provision, providing meals and support services to more than 40,000 individuals across 165 NYC zip codes (and 5 outside of the city). The largest community-based food pantry in New York City, NYCP is committed to reducing hunger for individuals and families in New York City while promoting dignity and self-sufficiency. NYCP champions the cause of the hungry through food pantry and meal distribution programs, nutrition education, basic hygiene services, homeless support, and related services.

Over the past year, NYCP has continued to grow its programs – it served more than 2.9 million meals in FY2014, a more than 16% year over year increase. In addition, NYCP and its onsite partners helped clients access almost \$6.0 million in benefits and services. NYCP would clearly not be able to meet these needs without its supporters like Brick. Notably, almost 50% of the manpower at NYCP is provided on a volunteer ba-

sis.

This ministry participates in two major church-wide food and supply drives each year, with one in the fall and one in the winter. The NYCP Deacons also sponsor an annual Turkey Drive each Thanksgiving, raising more than \$6000 in 2014. As in past years, NYCP will be a site for Day of Discipleship volunteering, with four efforts on site and at Brick. We will also be organizing a number of additional volunteer efforts this year at NYCP.

In an effort to extend the NYCP Ministry and to establish greater involvement from Brick Church School and its children, the school participates in three food and supply drives plus the Turkey Drive during the school year. Each drive requests a different item, from cereal and juice boxes to canned goods to toiletry items. These items are presented by the children for donation to NYCP during one of the Wednesday chapel services. The drives have been very successful and are an effective way to teach the children about giving to those in need.

SEARCH AND CARE

In 1972 an Upper East Side non-profit agency was founded to help keep frail seniors in their homes. Search and Care has a board of directors, staff and many volunteers to accomplish their goals. It has recently been acknowledged that one of the most important goals is to furnish lonely seniors with companionship. Even though it is of course necessary to help them get to medical or hospital appointments, to do paperwork, including bill paying, and to guide them in good decision making, it is the friendship shared that seems to matter the most. The Brick Church supplies one volunteer to help with escorting the elderly to appointments, one to help with the phones in the offices at 1844 Second Avenue, and one to coordinate with an inbound church member. We share our experiences at the Lay Pastoral Care meetings directed by Rev. Doug King, so that we are on 'the same page' in understanding our responsibilities, and discovering how to better do our jobs. A fourth volunteer has recently been found interested in helping, and has been interviewed, thanks to one of the current Deacons.

Each November Search and Care presents a cabaret musical performance through 'VocalEase' in the Carnegie Room of Brick Church.

The songs by the professional Broadway performers are enjoyed by Search and Care's local community and some Brick Church members. Food and refreshments are also served by Search and Care staff and volunteers, who like to see the clients having a good time. In the late summer a picnic is organized in Central Park at the garden at 104th Street when again everyone present enjoys the group companionship offered. In 2014 the usual November Sentinel Committee meeting at Brick wasn't scheduled. It offers guidelines and answers questions regarding home health care and its finances.

Often frail seniors have few family members living nearby. A nursing home is increasingly not the only option for all concerned. The companionship of a dog, cat, or other pet often helps banish loneliness, but there is nothing to replace the concern and attention that human kindness can bring. To that end Search and Care is to be thanked for their valuable input in organizing a smoother life style for the frail in our midst. Robin Strashun, the volunteer director, is so helpful a coordinator in guiding us.

The ever popular Mom's Morning Out group chaired by members Ashley Carlson and Kate Hrobsky, brings babies, toddlers and moms together for a weekly play date. Education Chairs, Clare Pickering and Jill Worth thoughtfully plan our important and inspiring Lenten Bible Study. Each of these volunteers allow the events and happenings of the Women's Association to be well organized and meaningful to all.

The Brick Church Fair is the Women's Association's only fundraising event. The Fair not only includes the November Christmas Fair, but two Rummage Sales, a Spring Boutique and the Dinner Dance and Silent Auction. The success of the 2014 Fair enables us to continue to support our outreach grant-giving program and our scholarship program. COMMUNITY REPORTS

Troop 662 of the Boy Scouts of America is an active troop of three dozen boys ages 11-17, 21 of whom are First Class or higher. In 2014, the Troop completed seven weekend campouts, a two-day ski trip to Catamount Ski Area in Massachusetts in which 28 scouts and parents participated, in addition to Saturday bowling, swimming, and cooking outings. Five of our scouts have been inducted into the Order of the Arrow, the national honor society of the BSA. We are delighted to announce that six boys from Troop 662 will attend Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico this summer for two weeks of back country camping and hiking.

REPORT OF THE CORPORATION AND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Corporation of the Brick Presbyterian Church in the City of New York was chartered in 1809 and is governed by a twelve-person Board of Trustees elected by the Congregation from among its members. Each year, four members are chosen to serve three-year terms; two such terms may be served consecutively. The Trustees are charged with responsibility for maintaining the buildings and grounds, and supervising the investment funds and the overall fiscal well-being of the Church. In addition to monthly meetings of the entire Board, all members serve on various committees which address specific areas of concern to the Corporation and which may also include other church members with expertise in relevant areas. Committees of the Trustees include Buildings and Grounds, Investment, Audit, Legal, and Insurance. In addition, the

Trustees have representatives on the Stewardship and Personnel Committees, on the Joint Finance Committee, and on the All Church Nominating Committee.

The Trustees' paramount responsibility is to manage a comprehensive investment and endowment strategy and maintain sound financial operations for the Church. The Trustees Investment Committee consists of twelve members of the congregation, expert in asset management, plus the Senior Pastor, the Director of Administration and Finance, and the Treasurer, Louisa Palmer, *ex officio*. This committee was ably chaired this year by Kurt Roeloffs, and obtains advice from the investment consulting firm Colonial Consulting. The committee's activities during 2014 are more fully described in a separate report included herein.

The second continuing priority of

the Trustees is managing the Brick Church's extensive facilities. The Buildings and Grounds committee was led this year by Timothy Haskin. The committee has developed a multi-year plan to anticipate and assess future building projects as well as prioritize the work. The major focus of the work in 2014 was on the continued modernization of the Church's HVAC systems. A separate report on Buildings and Grounds is also included herein.

Also during 2014, a review of the Church's security systems and procedures was undertaken with the advice of a Church member expert in these areas. Some suggestions for improvement were made, which will be implemented in 2015.

The Trustees would like to thank our pastors, staff, committee members, and in particular, Laila Al-Askari, Director of Administration and Finance, and Rob Dayboch, our Facilities Manager, for their cooperation and support during the year.

Under New York State law, this Annual Report is required to contain certain information regarding the "Members" of the Corporation. Since all members of the Church are Members of the Corporation, we refer readers to the Statistical Report appearing on page 37 which contains information on the number of members as of the end of 2014, the increase in members during the year, and a statement of the place where the names and places of residence of the current members may be found.

The Investment Funds

The Trustees' Investment Committee oversees the management (on a pooled basis) of approximately 30 different funds (the "Portfolio") whose total assets as of December 31, 2014 were \$40.1 million, a nearly identical sum to its balance one year earlier. Our current policy for withdrawals is 4.75% of our Portfolio with a few exceptions for restricted gifts. The Trustees have approved a continued 4.75% draw during 2015.

Our Portfolio achieved a net return of 4.0% over one year, 10.4% over three years, 8.5% over five years, 5.0% over seven years and 6.1% over ten years. Although the Portfolio underperformed our benchmark over one, three and five years periods, it has outperformed our benchmark over seven and ten year periods. This shorter term underperformance is a definite concern that the Committee continues to address, but the Committee remains focused on and committed toward the Portfolio's long term returns. Our goal is to provide steady, sustainable funding for all of our church's activities into perpetuity which the Portfolio has been able to do because of its long term record of outperformance.

Indeed, the Portfolio is actually structured to underperform in a rapidly rising market like the one we have had over the past five years. This is a purposeful trade-off in exchange for outperformance over full market cycles like the cycle we have had over the past ten years. We accomplish this trade-off by picking a number of conservative managers and conservative strategies which consciously miss some of the upside during rapidly rising markets in order to deliberately avoid the more costly, severe declines

that inevitably occur at the end of bull markets.

Although we have designed the Portfolio in this manner, we do not simply sit on our hands when our managers and strategies underperform. In each case of a manager who has underperformed for a considerable period, the Committee undertakes a formal review of the manager's strategy, tactics, investment team and operations in order to assess whether or not the manager's underperformance will persist or reverse. If we believe the manager is not able to reverse his underperformance in the medium to long term, then we replace the manager with another manager (or passive investment alternative) which we view as more likely to contribute the Portfolio's long term outperformance. This is a difficult, even treacherous, endeavor. One only knows the results of one's choice many years later!

Over the past one and three year periods, the managers who have had the biggest underperformance versus their peers and market segment have been BBH (US Large Cap Equities), DFA (International Equities), Luxor Capital Partners (Hedge Fund), Van Eck (Commodities) and our private equity portfolio. With the exception of our private equity portfolio which cannot be easily sold, each of these underperforming managers will be reviewed in order to determine if our investments with the manager should be held or sold.

For the past eight years, we have engaged Colonial Consulting, an investment advisory firm that specializes in advising educational, charitable and religious clients with endowments. During our relationship with Colonial, our long term record is excellent but our shorter term record is less than excellent. Consequently, Colonial Consulting and the Investment Committee continue to look very closely at all elements of our investment strategy, investment processes, and investment managers in order to determine whether any further changes are required for us to more consistently meet or exceed our targeted returns.

The Investment Committee is blessed to have the benefit of highly skilled and dedicated investment professionals, including: James Awad, Henry Barkhorn, Mary (Bibi) Conrad, Horace (Ace) Crary, Michael Fisch, Linda Gridley, Charles Higgins, Craig Huff, Richard Miller, Roger Miller, Willis (Bill) Ryckman, Richard (Rick) Stowe, and Deane Turner. We look forward to maintaining the strong long term track record of the Investment Portfolio by continuing to identify and addressing the nearer term concerns that might diminish continued long term success.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

Our buildings continue to serve us well. The major project in 2014 was the long awaited replacement of the “Green Monster,” an air-handling unit installed over 50 years ago.

Approved Projects for 2014 included:

- Repair Honor Wall – Moved to 2015
- New lighting in Parish House stairwells – Moved to 2015
- Sanctuary Red Leather door and closers - Completed
- Replace HVAC Parish House basement – 95% Completed
- Youth Floor “Green Monster” replacement, new ceiling - Completed

Capital spending on various church improvements and the Green Monster replacement totaled approximately \$739,639. The Green Monster project at over \$500,000 was one the largest ever expenditures in one year. In 2014 Brick Church spent \$1,074,521 on building operations, which was approximately equal to the cost of operating the facility in 2013. The Brick Day School operated its June program as usual and the Summer Steps pilot program continued through July for a successful third year.

The Brick Facilities team undertook measures to ensure the safety of the building which now includes a comprehensive Safety and

Facilities Use Manual for the entire campus including special operating instructions for the projector, sound and light systems in Watson Hall.

The Buildings & Grounds (B&G) Committee in cooperation with the Joint Finance Committee and the Trustees follow the Buildings and grounds Budgeting and Spending Policy for Operating Expenses and Capital Expenditures. Authority and responsibility are clearly given with written limits, as well an approval process for the unforeseen projects that old buildings require. In the fall, B&G presented a reduced detailed capital spending plan and plant services budget for 2015 which were both revised and approved at just over \$300,000 and \$925,919 respectively. We are currently working on the 2016 projects to include in the 2016 budget presentation.

COMMENTS ON THE STATEMENT OF REVENUE AND EXPENSE

The 2014 Statement of Operating Revenue and Expenditures is displayed in a summary sheet which is divided into a Revenue Statement and an Expenditure Statement. The Revenue Statement is composed of four major areas which include the Contributions and other non-endowment income of the Church; the amounts take from the endowment funds to support annual operations; the Revenues, Direct Expenses and Net Contributions for Space and Services of the Day School; and the Revenues and Expenses of the Summer Steps Program.

The Church revenue is received mainly through Stewardship Contributions and draw from the endowment. The Women's Association is supported primarily through proceeds from the annual Fair - which includes the Christmas Fair and the Spring Dance, together with annual dues, other contributions and income on its scholarship funds. This income supports the Women's Association's personnel and program costs, as well as funding its scholarship and outreach programs and a contribution to the Church.

The Day School is funded through annual tuition, the biannual auction, and contributions from its special purpose funds. The Day School funds its direct operating costs together with an annual overhead contribution that is paid to the Church for the Day School's share of the general building and operating costs. For 2014 the Day School contribution to church overhead was slightly under \$780,000.

Summer Steps is a program started three years ago to help prepare low-income students for kindergarten in the independent schools. It is funded by support from 21 New York City independent schools and private donations, and by the Brick Church's contribution of space and services for the program.

The expense statement indicates the expenses for each area in the budget. The Church revenue supports pastoral services, the music program, a significant benevolence grants program to local charities, all the costs for each committee's activities, along with all the administrative and building costs, including maintenance, insurance, and personnel.

The annual budget goal is to operate with a balanced budget. Deficits occurred in 2013 and 2014 partly as a result of a less than expected level of stewardship support in 2014, as well as significant expenditures for employee benefits, professional accounting services, and event expenses. Over the past five years, the Church has had a cumulative operating surplus of approximately \$200,000, or about .5% of its operating revenues during the period.

In 2014, Capital Expenditures of approximately \$575,000 exceeded the budgeted \$300,000 allowance in lieu of depreciation. The majority of the funds supported the continued modernization of the HVAC system. Between 2005 and 2012, annual capital expenses had been consistently less than the budgeted allowance, permitting the Church to build up reserves for major projects such as the Watson Hall and Kitchen Renovation and other building and HVAC projects described elsewhere in this report.
