# WORSHIP NOTES

Our opening hymn today, *I Sing the Mighty Power of God*, was composed by Isaac Watts (1674-1748) and was first published in 1715 in Watts' *Divine Songs Attempted in Easy Language for Children*. Its heading was *Praise for Creation and Providence*. The tune *Ellacombe* is an 18th century German tune, but seems not to have been used in England until 1868. The tune is "spacious": a fitting description of a tune surveying the wonders of creation. Perhaps the tune name is meant to be identified with the Devonshire village of that name, but there is no known connection between the two. Some think the more likely connection is that the tune name honors Thomas Ellacombe (1790-1885), a campanologist (campanology: the art of bell ringing) and Anglican clergyman, who devised an apparatus (now named for him) that allows one person to achieve the effect of several change ringers. Given that the first five notes of this tune resemble several bell patterns, this may indeed be the connection. The tune's composer, William H. Monk, is known to have named several other hymn tunes for his contemporaries.

The hymn tune of our last hymn, *Sing Praise to God Who Reigns Above*, is *Mit Freuden zart* and was first published in a collection in Berlin in 1566. This tune is associated with the Bohemian Brethren and bears resemblance to several other tunes, both sacred and secular. Of sacred tunes, it bears resemblance to the melody paired with Psalm 138 in the 1551 edition of the Genevan Psalter. Another influence may have been the French secular song, *A Gentle Shepherdess*, published by Pierre Attaingnant circa 1529-1530. The tune name means "with gentle joy for this journey."

**Thomas Tallis** (c. 1505-1585), composer of *Hear the Voice and Prayer*, was an English composer. He was appointed organist of Waltham Abbey about 1536, until the abbey was dissolved in 1540. He became a gentleman of the Chapel Royal in 1542, composing and performing for Henry VIII, Edward VI, Queen Mary, and Queen Elizabeth. He remained an avowed Catholic his entire life, and his music composition for the Catholic Church continued unimpeded when the Church of England became the law upon the coronation of Elizabeth in 1559.
